International Women's Day



We know that women participate in disproportionate amounts of paid and unpaid care tasks and domestic labourⁱ. We know that girls and women experience violence and abuse, sexual, physical and emotional, disproportionately to men, and overwhelmingly at the hands of menⁱⁱ. We know God has a different vision for our world – one of safety, loving community and mutual service and kindness toward each other.

The world marks International Women's Day, March 8, to promote the full inclusion, safety and prosperity of women. When the standard of living for women is increased, through labour force participation with fair pay, education and improved health, entire communities benefit and reap the rewards. Children, families and entire communities live healthier, happier lives when women live in safety and peace with empowered participation.

In his book, *The Hole in Our Gospel*, World Vision US President Emeritus Rich Stearns writes, 'In my opinion, the single most significant thing that can be done to cure extreme poverty is this: Protect, educate, and nurture girls and women and provide them with equal rights and opportunities — educationally, economically, and socially.'ⁱⁱⁱ

The Christian Care Sunday project provides resources for congregations to acknowledge the vulnerable people in our communities, and the many organisations who work with them. This International Women's Day you are invited to consider a prayer for girls and women worldwide, for an end to domestic and family violence, and for the mutual flourishing of all people as we live in community with each other.
