Scripture Application

and Leadership Training

The Scripture Application and Leadership Training (SALT) course was held in Ubuo May 10-26, led by four members of the SALT team (PNG), assisted by Nate Weaver (Canada) who is our Scripture Use worker for the Gulf Delta Cluster Project. 48 Kope people attended the course, including a number of young men who previously had little to do with church, but were spending their time and their money on smoking tobacco and chewing betel nut. God really touched the hearts of these men, and they now have their eyes fixed on God and are living for him. God also worked in the lives of those who have been Christians for some time, and they have been excited to take what they learnt on outreaches to other villages, where people are soaking up God's Word.

Our main goal with the Gulf Delta Cluster Project is to make disciples who make disciples. Mostly this is a long and slow goal, as people often grow in ways that you cannot see until you look back over the space of a few years, and deep change can take generations. To be able to so quickly see the SALT participants growing, changing and taking what they learnt to other people, has been an enormous encouragement to me. At the start of SALT I was feeling disappointed, as we invited five language communities to attend the course, but only the Kope came. This disappointment has since been overshadowed by the joy of seeing people growing as disciples, and going out and making disciples.

Oral Bible Storytelling #3

Our third Oral Bible Storytelling (OBS) course was run at the training centre from May 31 – June 16. Six language communities attended this time, with a few new people joining the workshop. Two language communities did not return, and we do not know if this was due to transport issues, to landowner issues, or something else entirely. While we provide a certain amount of transport to and from the course, participants are responsible for meeting the boats at the right pick-up points. There have also been many landowner meetings happening due to potential development opportunities in the area, and while some participants sent apologies because of these, they may also explain some of those we did not receive an apology from.

OBS3 went well, with all the six communities learning all five stories. This time our stories were all from the life of Jesus, either miracle stories or parables. At our third workshop it feels like we were finally breaking through to natural storytelling. This has previously been a challenge, as with learning any new skill, it can take awhile for it to become natural. Pray for all the storytellers as they now share God's Word in their communities.

Training Centre

The Oroi'io Madei (Living Word) Training Centre (OMTC) continues to be a blessing by giving space for workshops to happen. Going over the accounts following the dedication of the OMTC dorm we have found we have enough money to pay all our bills, plus a bit extra to finish a few things we had put aside when fundraising was going slowly.

During this trip we established a Property Management Committee. Pray for them as they take responsibility for property maintenance and assist with course management. While some members of the team have demonstrated their commitment to the work, there are others who seem to be in it for personal gain. Their desire to gain benefits where none are available is a significant cause of stress for me. At the same time, I also get to work alongside amazing people who have a heart to serve God, their community and neighbouring language groups, and who shine God's light brightly. These people are a constant encouragement to me and are the backbone of the work we do together.

Kope Translation

It feels like the Kope translation work has paused lately, but it depends what lens I look through. It is true that the drafting of Acts is going slowly and that Genesis has stalled. It is also true that last year we focussed on translating the posters for the SALT course, and that these are now being used weekly and bearing a harvest. This trip we were able to return to work in Acts, and while there were some tricky sections to work through, the team also produce quality drafts. They are planning to meet to continue drafting on Mondays and Tuesdays while I am in the Highlands. Pray for them to be consistent in meeting and working together, for them to have wisdom and insight in their work, and for God's word to touch them as they work.

In December this year I plan to start a 13-month home assignment (previously known as furlough). After a four-and-a-half-year field term, it will be good to be back in Australia for a significant block of time. It will also be strange to be back, as I am not sure I know how to be Australian anymore.

The current plan is to fly to Queensland for a break and then travel to Victoria for Christmas and family holidays. This home assignment I plan to live out of a car, rather than out of a suitcase. I am looking to buy a decent campervan and use that as my base as I travel around to catch up with my scattered family, friends and supporters across Australia. I have been looking online at the style of van I want, and intend to buy one soon after returning to Australia. #vanlife here I come!

Around February I will start to be available to speak at churches, women's fellowships etc. In late August I plan to start putting together an actual travel plan, so please email me if you would like me to come and share in your congregation. I need to decide about an invitation to teach at the SIL Australia summer school in Jan-Feb, and if I would like to take on further studies. I would also love to go and visit some of my friends who have returned from PNG to their home countries, but need to decide if I can afford a round-the-world ticket to go and see my framily (friends who have become like family) in NZ, USA (Washington state), Canada (Ontario), UK, Netherlands and Germany.

Personal

Last newsletter I mentioned my struggle with the annual departure of friends. While it is always hard to say goodbye, the tide has now turned and the annual return has begun. I am enjoying reconnecting with friends who have been away, and enjoying old friends being my new neighbours in a house that was empty for about two years.

Healthwise I continue to struggle with chronic headaches. They were mostly okay while in Gulf Province, but I have had a rough run the last week or two. I plan to follow up with a headache clinic while on home assignment next year, in the hope of finally finding answers and relief.

Having had an intense amount of village time this year, I am now quite tired. I am thankful for all the good things God has been doing in Gulf and that I can be part of them. I am also thankful to be here in Ukarumpa for the next few months, and to be planning three nights of Vitamin Sea in Madang soon. While in Ukarumpa I have plenty of paperwork, planning, communication and other things to keep me busy.
