FEBRUARY, YEAR B

(Recommended: READ summary BEFORE reading the Bible verses!)

☐ February 1 Job 21: 1-34

Reflect: Job attacks the basic criticism of his comforters. Experience proves that the wicked sometimes reach old age and grow mighty in power. The wicked often die unpunished and are eulogised as heroes. Virtue is often not rewarded.

Prayer: Father, though we cannot understand the riddle why some suffer and some don't we know that You will make all things work together for our good. Amen.

☐ February 2 Job 22: 1-30

Reflect: Eliphaz confronts Job with a list of "iniquities" for which he must be guilty if he is suffering like he is: Is Job a pitiless creditor; a man untouched by human misery; an unscrupulous land-hungry baron; an exploiter rather than a supporter of the helpless? Eliphaz urges him to confess his sins and make his peace with God.

Prayer: O God, turn us daily to You in faith that we may find peace with You. Amen.

☐ February 3 Job 23: 1-17

Reflect: Job resents the accusation about unconfessed crimes. He struggles with a paradox. He is afraid of God, yet longing to see Him; conscious of His presence, yet unable to find Him; assured of His absolute justice, yet sure of his own innocence.

Prayer: O Father, thank You for Your presence to empower our lives. Amen.

☐ February 4 Job 24: 1-25

Reflect: Job replies: God is responsible for letting crimes inundate society. God seems to do nothing about poverty, so that crimes are allowed to go unpunished. Zophar says, Though God's justice may be delayed, it finally never fails.

Prayer: Holy God, Your mills of justice grind slowly, but exceedingly sure. Amen.

☐ February 5 Job 25 and 26

Reflect: Bildad now says: No man, even "blameless" Job serves God "for nothing". Job is cornered into revealing some selfishness. His problem is that God uses His power indiscriminately for the wicked as well as for the good.

Prayer: O God, help us to believe that you are both just and gracious. Amen.

☐ February 6 Job 27: 1-23

Reflect: Job addresses some of the points of his miserable comforters. Under oath he declares his friends were not right when they claimed that His suffering could only be due to unconfessed sins. His misery is not evidence of some terrible guilt.

Prayer: O Lord, when we reel under grief, give us Your grace to trust in You. Amen.

□ February 7 Job 28: 1-28

Reflect: Job's discourse now declares true wisdom means to look to God, not with slavish fear but with awesome respect and to depart from evil. We will not find the gem of priceless wisdom unless we seek it in God.

Prayer: O Jesus, give us wisdom that we may depart from evil and do good. Amen.

☐ February 8 Job 29: 1-25

Reflect: Job cannot understand why his God-fearing way of life did not continue to be rewarded by the benefits he once received in abundance. He had every reason to expect a long, peaceful existence on this earth, enjoying a close fellowship with God.

Prayer: Merciful Father, when things are going well, as we live in harmony with You and with people, for such joys make us humbly grateful to You. Amen.

☐ February 9 Job 30: 1-31

Reflect: "But now" he has lost everything: honour among men, physical well-being, fellowship with God, peace of mind. Job's agony is made the crueler by being stricken at the height of his powers. Now only cries of grief fill the air.

Prayer: Lord, help us when we had hoped for the best and got the worst. Amen.

Job cannot make law and order prevail everywhere. Nor can he make brute animals do his bidding. If he cannot domesticate Behemoth, the epitome of untamed animal life, he had better not criticise God. God rebukes Job's self-righteousness. Prayer: Lord God, when we consider the great strength of some of Your creatures, we realise our own insignificance and we are moved to trust in You. Amen. February 20 Job 41: 1-34 Reflect: Likewise, the Leviathan, a huge, crocodile-like animal, symbolising power beyond the control of man, but which like the chaotic sea is completely under the control of God. Job insisted that God repay him for his piety whereas God owes man including Job, nothing. Prayer: Father, may we lovingly share with others what You entrust to us. Amen. п Job 42: 1-17 February 21 Reflect: Job turns from his overweening pride and repents in dust and ashes. He is content to let God whose purposes cannot be thwarted, carry out His will in His own unfathomable way. Job is reinstated as God's servant. He received again all his children and double the value of his earthly possessions. God accepted Job's prayers for his comforters who had become his tormenters. Prayer: Lord, we do not know why You let us suffer by sometimes depriving us of what is most precious to us. But we thank You then for removing the test. Amen. Ecclesiastes 1: 1-18 Reflect: The word "Ecclesiastes" means Preacher. In this Book, the Preacher boldly states a thesis, the universality of which he is going to demonstrate. All of man's toil is summed up in the words: "All is vanity", emptiness of emptiness. Solomon was in a position to test out everything on this earth in a bid to find satisfaction. But he came to the conclusion that the quest for true happiness in things earthly is fruitless. Prayer: O God, no matter how we search we cannot find lasting happiness in things of this earth. Only in You, Jesus, can we fit the jigsaw puzzle of life together. Amen. February 23 Ecclesiastes 2: 1-26 Reflect: Solomon tries earthly pleasure, earthly wisdom, and work. The Preacher advises: enjoy the work itself for this too is a gift from the hand of God. But don't make true contentment dependent upon the outcome of your labour. Prayer: Lord God, enable us to focus our eyes on Jesus to find lasting joy. Amen. February 24 Ecclesiastes 3: 1-22 Reflect: Between our first and our last breath, situations often develop over which we have no control. But when we raise our sights above things of earth and look to God who made all things, we see we are no longer victims of time or circumstance. Prayer: We praise, O God, for choosing the right time and place for our good. Amen. Ecclesiastes 4: 1-16

Reflect: A miser's wealth is a poor substitute for human companionship. A simple person working hard for riches and no one to share it with sacrifices companionship for wealth. Misers do not find real satisfaction in a lonely pursuit of things material.

Prayer: Lord Jesus, help us to have the joy of partnership whenever possible. Amen.

February 26 Ecclesiastes 5: 1-20

Reflect: Turning from negative observations on human existence, the Preacher provides positive directives to be followed for man's relationship with God. He then adds advice on how to cope with a bad situation created by his fellowmen. In dealing with God, it's imperative to treat Him with holy awe. In worship, it's a sacrifice of fools to engage only in the outward motions of worship without the heartfelt resolve to conform one's life to God's will

Prayer: Merciful Father, put joy in our hearts as we occupy whatever time You give us, with thoughts and activities pleasing to You. Amen.
